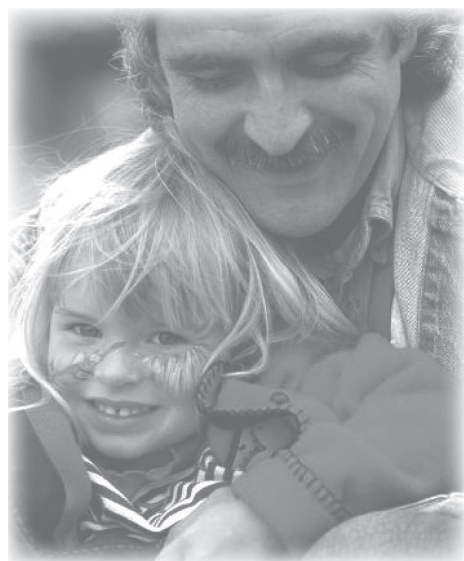


the Kinship Permanency Incentive (KPI) Program

KPI was created to support children in the homes of family or friends who have committed to caring for them, when birth parents cannot.

At this time, eligibility is only available for children you assumed custody of on or after July 1, 2005.



KPI Requirements

- A judge has ruled that your child was abused, neglected, dependent or unruly.
- A judge awarded legal custody of the child to you after July 1, 2005.
- Your income is not higher than 200% of federal poverty guidelines.



To receive the cash payments, eligible families must apply through their county public children services agency and complete a criminal background check.

KPI payments are in addition to Ohio Works First Cash assistance received for the child.

Other Supports

- The expanded Early Learning Initiative- *a preschool early childhood education program.*
- Ohio Works First Cash Assistance- *ask for a "child only" application.*
- The Kinship Navigator Program- *to assist you in finding other local resources.*

Contact your local public children services agency to find out more about KPI and other resources that may be available to you.

Support for relative and nonrelative “kin” and their children



The Kinship Permanency Incentive (KPI) Program provides cash payments to children in custody of kin if a judge has ruled that the child was abused, neglected, dependent or unruly.

Some kinship families will not be eligible for this program. However, it is important to find out what resources are available to your family. Contact your local public children services, or department of job and family services agency to find out more.
